Fire Building	Burns	Group and Leader	<p>Use Fire Craft Risk assessment in conjunction with this activity if fires are used.</p> <p>Have created Fire pits with room to move around the outside of the fire square and have seating 1.5 metres for inside fire pit. Instruction given how to move around the fire square and avoid smoke. Keep fire area clear of branches + dead leaves. Always have an adult supervising the fire(s). Tell children they must obey adults near fires – no running etc. No walking within seating circle. No lighted sticks to be removed from fire. If windy, no seated children on downwind side. Children to be <u>seated</u> around fire, on fixed log seating. Don't throw sticks into fire – can knock out burning pieces</p>	1	3	3
Fire trace and woodland respect	Woodland fire, damage to trees	Woodland	<p>Locate fire where it will not damage trees. Re-use old fire site if possible. Clear dead leaves from 6ft radius. Extinguish fire with water.</p>	1	3	3

Shelter Building	Bangs to head, body	Group and Leader	Ensure the site is clear of all built shelters – demolish and collect y’s ready for group and prep demonstration area. Do not allow children to demolish their shelters at the end. Check structure of new shelters is sound. Do not allow heavy poles in structure, especially roof. Warn of trip hazards from roots, branches, stumps, slippery ground and how to carry to minimise bumping into others.	1	3	3

Safety goggles can be worn	Group and Leader	Ensure the group are aware of any dangers these hazards may pose - issues raised in health and safety talk on arrival. Carrying sticks and poles	Banging head poking eyes	Group and Leader	Show children how to carry sticks or poles safely, No running. Warn children to watch for other people when moving poles.	2	2	4

Dog faeces	Infection and disease - areas with a high number of dog walkers should be avoided	Group and Leader	Ensure the group are aware of this potential problem. Leaders to carry antibacterial wipes in case of contact with animal faeces. Also to carry pooh bags to remove site check before visit.	2	2	4

Pond	Falling in, drowning	Group and Leader	Make group aware of the pond before we arrive, ask children to walk carefully and slowly around the pond.	1	3	3

<p>Additional Controls Needed/ Further Preventative Measures: Schools – Recommended OFSTED child ratio for school visits. Activities/events- Children supervised by accompanying adult at all times. No child to be left with LLFS Leader. Birthday parties – Parent/carer running party to have responsibility of children. Lucy's Little Forest School team will run the party and be in charge of all activities we do in the time allocated. Tell children/adults that risky activity, therefore must do as adults tell them. Stop the activity if children persistently behave dangerously. Water for burns, burns kit. Minimum 3 adult supervisors (i.e. WW + 2) Know your allotted helpers and make sure they know they are expected to help. Use your adult helpers e.g. to supervise fires. Make sure adults are listening to your safety talk(s)</p> <p>Schools and groups are only covered by Lucy's Little Forest School insurance and Health and safety procedures while attending a session led by a Lucy's Little Forest school leader - while at lunch, self led activities, lunch, play - non led by Lucy's Little Forest school the group must ensure they have relevant risk assessment and have conducted a pre visit check.</p>
